Stage 3 – Easing of Restrictions Plan

The Industry Plans have been updated to Stage 3 requirements

As of noon, July 3, 2020, the Queensland Government has eased the Corona Virus restrictions to Stage 3.

With all businesses allowed to open, this will allow Queensland to open up, so people can start to get back to normal; a new normal.

The most important thing that we must continue to observe is the **Social Distancing rules**: 1.5 meters between people and allowing, in most cases, 4 square meters per person.

So far Queensland has escaped a second wave of the Corona Virus because we have observed the restrictions laid down by our Government. If we continue to obey the rules, we will progress forward, and we will **not** finish up like Victoria.

Our Club

We shall continue to operate in line with the Industry COVID Safe Plan for Queensland Hotels and Clubs.

However, we still need to have our own Plan to cover our specific conditions and this is updated in the following information.

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From Friday July 10 the following will apply:

- The main area and deck will be classed as one area rather than two as was required in Stage 2.
- Limitations of numbers: for areas less than 200 square meters, 2 square meters per person is allowed with a limit of 50 people. We can therefore seat up to 50 people on a Friday night.
- Members only, no guests.
- Bookings! Names on the white board. No phone bookings except those not on Macleay Island.
- **Seating as arranged. No extra chairs or tables to be added unless approved by the Commodore.**
- Food will be served straight to tables.
- **Dirty plates to be returned to the designated tables for collection by kitchen staff.**
- Drinks may be purchased from the bar; however social distancing must be observed, 1.5 meters.
- Follow the marks on the floor when in line to observe Social Distancing.
- Bar opening time 6.00 p.m. (Friday)
- Kitchen staff only in the kitchen.
- Follow marks on the floor while in line, when paying for your meal.
- Use credit/debit cards etc, instead of cash where possible.
- Names of those attending will have their names listed, as is customary. As only members are in attendance, addresses and mobile numbers are readily available from Club register if required,
- If you are ill, stay home, do not come to the Club.
- Download the COVID Safe App.
- **Observe instructions from the Commodore and Management Committee members.**

Observe Social Distancing Rules as instructed by the Driver.

Courtesy transport must be frequently cleaned and disinfected between uses.

Social distancing must be maintained as far as possible during use. A contact information list must be kept for members travelling on the bus for contact tracing purposes, including name, address, and telephone number for a period of at least 56 days.

Boating

Stage 3 has also opened sporting activities. From our perspective, we can open more of the boating side of our Club.

By aligning the Club with the Aquatic Sports Sector COVID Safe Plan we can extend our operations to Dragon Boats, x6 Outriggers (OC6) and Sailing Boats.

Dragon Boats: Back to 20 Paddlers.

OC6: Six Paddlers.

Sailing Craft: Vagabonds. Two people per craft placed to observe Social Distancing requirements.

- All personnel visiting the Club for any reason, regardless of if they are using the Clubs equipment or as a spectator must provide their name, address and mobile number which will kept at the Club for 56 days in case of a COVID-19 outbreak.

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- A list of all paddlers in each boat to be kept for 56 days.
- Also, their destination and stopping points must be recorded.
- All shared equipment must be sanitised after each use.
- If you are ill, do not come to the Club.
- **Observe Social Distancing at all times, 1.5 meters.**
- Download the COVID Safe App
- Provide sanitising stations
- **Observe instructions from the Boating sub-committee and Management Committee members.**

This plan may change from time to time as requirements are altered.

The Tingira Boat Club History Project

Ahoy There!

The second history get together was held on Tuesday 14 July. Special guests at that meeting were **Meryl Dobe**, **George Vermassen**, **Trudy Mueller** and **Ruth Venner**. Together they shared reminiscences and their recollections of Tingira in the early days.

This week we continue the Tingira story with a recount of the erection of a second hand shed on land provided by Redland Shire Council on Sandpiper Beach. The shed would become the first Tingira Clubhouse.

1986 The Provision of Land on Sandpiper Beach and a Shed Clubhouse is Erected.

Deiter Nass recalled, “Well we could not say that it was a prime location, but it was the start. We were on the waterfront all right, but the water was too shallow to have access by boat. The land had to be drained and built-up because at high tide, and with the wind behind it, it flooded.”

The Club arranged working bees and with the help of the Redland Shire Council, the block was cleared, low lying sections were filled with landfill and drainage ditches were dug on each side of the block.

With the site prepared it was time to put down a concrete slab for the shed. The shed was the size of a double garage and had been purchased from Bill Schneid. Workers included George Carol, Henry Garland, Ray and Lynne Garner, Peter Chamberlain, Deiter and Sandy Nass, Jon, Beryl, Arthur, and little Sam.

Deiter Nass recalls, “Next thing of course is to erect the shed and decide how to organise the inside. We needed to have a bar with storage for drinks, refrigeration cabinets and storage for our other equipment.

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For seating we added a veranda roof to one side of the shed (now clubhouse). We got some folding tables and chairs and other furnishings appeared from Club members.



(The Club is fortunate to have a painting by Meryl Dobe that depicts the original shed clubhouse (and outhouse toilet). Meryl was commissioned by the Boat Club to paint the scene in 1993. It won the Ruth and Jim Bates Trophy at the 13th Annual Macleay Island Art Complex Exhibition (1993). The scene was painted from the edge of Coast Road (then a dirt track). It shows part of the Art Complex building to the right. In the foreground is a pile of debris and rubbish from land clearing that was taking place to prepare the site of the current Clubhouse. The concrete slab that the shed stood upon can still be seen today, close to the water's edge, and now used as a wash down and storage area for the outrigger canoes. This painting is currently hanging in the foyer of the Boat Club).

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With the Clubhouse now up and running, the Friday night get togethers were well attended, with members bringing a plate of food to share and of course the subjects they wanted to discuss around the fire.

On weekends work continued on improving the clubhouse facilities by putting in a septic tank for the toilets and bar sink. There could not be an (official) opening day for the clubhouse until the septic was finished. This was made more difficult, because at the same time, the Bowls and Golf Clubs were also striving to be established.

Deiter Nass recalls, “Finally it came to our opening day. We were all set up with our cooking facilities to be left in the care of Inge (Vermassen) and the bar with George (Vermassen) and Noelene. There was music and games for the kids. We had decorations everywhere and a large sign “Tingira Sailing Club, Macleay Island”. We were all very proud of what we had achieved and the day was a great success.”



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This painting of the Boat Club in 1992 was also the work of Meryl Dobe. It depicts the Club from a slightly different perspective. Meryl was presented the Esther & Arthur Relph Trophy for Macleay Island Scenes for this painting at the Macleay Island Art Groups's 12th annual exhibition.

Next week we will continue the Tingira story and focus on some interesting (and quite funny) boating tales from the 80s and early 90s era.
